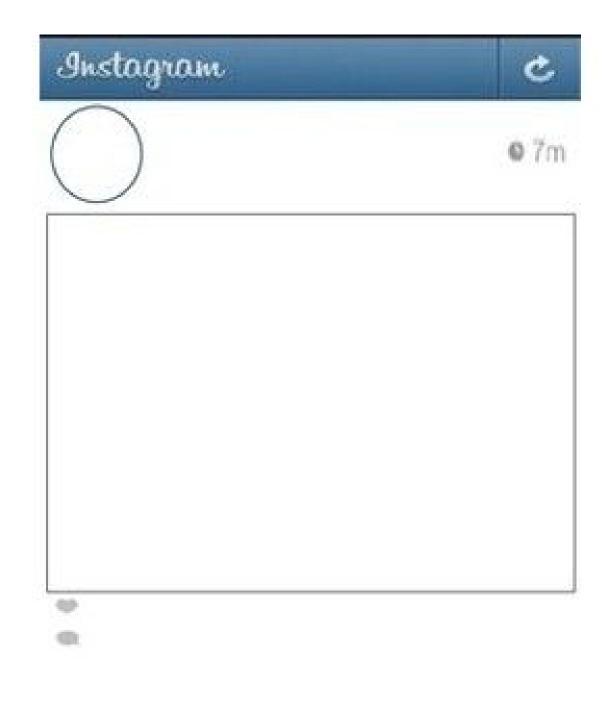
Generally speaking the points of view are:
